Children in Std 7J were given a creative piece to write, where the children had to design the most amazing and weird job and this is what some children came up with. Please note, this work is not edited.



Cookery Challenge Std 2 & 3



Mini Pizza

Who doesn't love pizza!

Ingredients

6 crumpets or mini pittas 4 tbsp ketchup ½ tsp dried oregano Toppings of your choice (peppers, cherry tomatoes, red onion, sweetcorn, olives, ham, basil, mushrooms, pineapple, avocado, shredded cooked chicken... all work well) 75g cheddar cheese, grated

Method

1.Heat the grill to high. Lightly toast the crumpets/ pittas in a toaster or under the grill. Meanwhile, mix the ketchup and oregano together in a bowl. Season. Chop your chosen toppings into small pieces – young children can tear basil, or chop soft veg in a cup using safety scissors.

2. Line a baking tray with foil. Spread the sauce over the crumpets or pittas, then add the toppings and top with cheese. Arrange on the tray and grill for 3-4 mins, until the cheese is golden and bubbling. Leave to cool slightly before eating.

Blueberry Pancakes

Ingredients

200g self-raising flour1 egg1 tsp baking powder300ml milk150g blueberriesKnob of butterSunflower oil or a little butter for cookingGolden or maple syrup

Method

1. Mix together 200g self-raising flour, 1 tsp baking powder and a pinch of salt in a large bowl.

2. Beat 1 egg with 300ml milk, make a well in the centre of the dry ingredients and whisk in the milk to make a thick smooth batter.

3. Beat in a knob of melted butter, and gently stir in half of the 150g pack of blueberries.

4. Heat a teaspoon of sunflower oil or small knob of butter in a non-stick frying pan.
5. Drop a large tablespoonful of the batter per pancake into the pan to make pancakes.
6. Cook for about 3 minutes over a medium heat until small bubbles appear on the surface of each pancake, then turn and cook another 2-3 minutes until golden.

8. Serve with golden or maple syrup and the rest of the blueberries.
































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
