On Wednesday 7 November, our students sat their Trinity College London Music Exams. For some children, it was their first group, or individual exam and they all performed extremely well. Well done to our ensembles: the Senior and Junior Marimba Bands, who all performed very well, with the Junior Band obtaining 92% and the Senior Band 89%. The standard expected for these exams is extremely high and to achieve a pass, you must obtain 60% to 74%, to achieve a merit, 75% and 86% and a distinction is 87% and above.
